

The 129th Annual Meeting of the American Hampshire Sheep Association is hereby called to meet Tuesday - November 13, 2018 - 6:00pm - at the North American Livestock Exposition in Louisville, Kentucky.

The Purpose of the Annual Meeting will be to elect Directors from Districts 1, 5 and 7 as well as one At-Large Director and to transact any other business which may come before the Association. Election of Officers (President, Vice President and Executive Committee) shall be made by the Board of Directors, following the Annual Meeting. These newly elected officers and the Executive Committee shall serve for one year, or until the next Annual Meeting.

A Ballot will be mailed to you for your convenience, should you be unable to attend in person, as set forth in Article XVI of the constitution. Exercise your rights and take advantage of the ballot to fulfill your responsibility as a member of the AHSA. Please follow the instructions on the ballot so your vote will be valid. Ballots must be postmarked by November 5th.

District 1: Lisa Hanson, OR (served 3 terms, ineligible for re-election)
District 5: Phyllis Davison, KS (served 3 terms, ineligible for re-election)
District 7: Scott Van Sickle, KY (served 2 terms, eligible for re-election)
At-large: Tom Bobendrier, MN (served 2 terms, eligible for re-election)

Only Senior/Active Members residing in the districts up for election may vote for a Director in their District.

All Senior/Active Members may vote for the At-Large Director. An active member is defined as a member of the AHSA who has paid dues in the last 24 months.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting will be mailed upon request only.

FEATURING METRO/RUPN HAMPS



INTRODUCE YOURSELF & YOUR FAMILY

Metro Hamps/Rupnow Hamps LLC consists of Jim and Sue Rupnow and Heidi, Alan and Ty Thorson. Heidi is the youngest of Jim and Sue's 4 children. We currently live and farm in Columbus, WI, just 20 miles north east of Madison, WI.

GIVE US A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF YOUR HAMPSHIRE FLOCK

The farm started in 1976 in Wausau, WI when Jim and Sue bought their first Hampshires for a 4-H project for the kids. In 1990 we decided to change the direction of the flock and move to more of a wether type sheep to have lambs for the kids to show at the county and state fair. We purchased a ram from Cabaniss Club Lambs that took us to a whole new level. Jim and Sue continued to keep the flock growing as the kids went through college. In 2002, Heidi and Alan started their own flock of registered Hampshires in Covington, GA with 6 ewes purchased from Jim and Sue and a Ram from Heidi's brother, Eric Rupnow. In 2007, Heidi, Alan, and Ty moved back to Wisconsin and we worked together with Jim and Sue, sharing rams and resources. In 2016 the 2 farms were merged and officially became one. We currently have 65 mature ewes with 15 replacement ewe lambs ready to go into production.

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE TO INCLUDE REGISTERED HAMPSHRIES IN YOUR SHEEP OPERATION?

Sue grew up raising Hampshire sheep in northern Illinois so it was a logical choice for her when the Rupnow Hamps flock started. We find Hampshire sheep to be versatile and functional on many levels. They fit well as a wether type and as a slick shorn breed. We truly love the way they look on pasture as well as all cleaned up in the show ring.

WHAT IS THE FAVORITE PLACE YOU HAVE VISITED?

Let's face it, we don't go many places that don't involve a sheep show and we cherish the people we have met and the opportunities we have had attending shows across the country.

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR PEOPLE STARTING OUT IN THE SHEEP BUSINESS?

Focus. Pick the type of sheep you want to raise and stick with it. Don't chase trends. Study pedigrees and find breeders that you trust when it's time to buy a ram.

WHAT ARE ONE OR TWO ITEMS THAT YOU HAVE FOUND TO BE CRITICAL FOR THE SUCCESS OF YOUR SHEEP OPERATION?

We have found keeping replacement females for a consistent ewe base both phenotypically and genetically is key. As a small flock, this allows us to change one piece at a time with a single ram purchase.

WHO ARE SOME PEOPLE THAT YOU CREDIT FOR YOUR SUCCESS WITH HAMPSHIRES?

Cabaniss Club Lambs really changed our flock back in the 90s. We consider our ewe base uniquely ours with almost all of the ewes born here on the farm from rams purchased from Ott Club Lambs, MacLennan Club Lambs, and Miller Hampshires throughout the years.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE SPORTS TEAM?

All Wisconsin. Brewers, Badgers and The Green Bay Packers. On Wisconsin!

WHAT IS THE TOP ITEM ON YOUR BUCKET LIST?

Jim and Sue: Trailing the Sheep in Idaho.

FEATURING TOM AND MONA HUBER

INTRODUCE YOURSELF & YOUR FAMILY

Tom and Mona were raised on farms in Indiana and Kentucky, respectively. They have lived in Georgia since 1966. Tom is a retired professor of physiology and pharmacology from the University of Georgia veterinary college. They purchased a 35 acre farm in 1972 and have had sheep ever since. Tom served 18 years on the Hampshire board of directors and as president for four years during the computation of the office and the centennial. The Huber sheep listed as examples



on the registration applications were the first sheep added to the computer program.

GIVE US A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF YOUR HAMPSHIRE FLOCK

We started with a small commercial flock to determine how sheep would do in the Georgia climate. In the late 70's we purchased two Bobendrier ewe lambs at the North American Hampshire sale and a Hampshire ram from Van Fleck farms. We now have 25 home bred ewes and have used home bred rams the last several years. Although we have not consigned sheep to many sales we have sold sheep into 11 states and 1 foreign country (Aruba).

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE TO INCLUDE REGISTERED HAMPSHRIES IN YOUR SHEEP OPERATION?

We wanted to participate in Hampshires association activities such as shows, sales, and annual meetings. It was a good way for us to find replacement rams and ewes of the type we needed. Also, registered Hampshire were needed by young exhibitors for their shows.

WHAT IS THE FAVORITE PLACE YOU HAVE VISITED?

Aruba. The folks who bought 2 ewes and a ram from us have become close friends. We visited Aruba and had a great time.

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR PEOPLE STARTING OUT IN THE SHEEP BUSINESS?

Determine what area of sheep production that you think you are interested in. Visit a farm of a successful producer of sheep that you are interested in. Look at all sheep and facilities including amount of pasture, fences, barns and anything else you had not thought of. I tell folks not buy many at first and keep them through breeding, lambing and marketing. Then decide if you want more or none. Make sure that you start with healthy sheep.

WHAT ARE ONE OR TWO ITEMS THAT YOU HAVE FOUND TO BE CRITICAL FOR THE SUCCESS OF YOUR SHEEP OPERATION?

Learning what type of breeding program will result in sheep that can handle heat and humidity and don't need a feed bucket the year around to stay in good body condition and healthy. Select replacements that have some immunity to internal parasites.

WHO ARE SOME PEOPLE THAT YOU CREDIT FOR YOUR SUCCESS WITH HAMPSHIRES?

It is impossible to name all the people who have given me advice during the past 40 years. But a few including: Buster Wilson, Dan Schlichter, Jim Cretcher, and Pete Bobendrier were helpful along the way.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE SPORTS TEAM?

Purdue basketball since I am a former Purdue player. Football is Georgia Bulldogs.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE FOOD?





The Importance of Record Keeping

Record keeping is a very important part of raising sheep, especially when it comes to breeding animals and filing taxes. While record keeping can be used in a lot of different aspects of life, it is very important in the sheep industry and it helps breeders and buyers it purchasing lambs.

While many producers will use record keeping for their businesses and other aspects of their lives, many forget that keeping records of production still is very important and can help a producer be more efficient and organized when trying to find information about a lamb or a ewe.

Why Should I Keep Records?

When producers go to breed ewes, it is important to keep track of what ewes are bred to what ram, so it makes it easier when the breeder goes to register lambs when they are older. Keeping track of the date of birth, birth type, dam, and sire are all vital when it comes to registering sheep.

Not only is it important to keep records of individual sheep, but also keeping records of business decisions, income, purchases, and other profits and expenses to ensure organization and make it easier to find relatable information when it is needed.

Many breeders who run large flocks, try to keep as accurate of records as they possibly can to save time and effort in the future. If a potential buyer wants to know more about a certain lamb and a breeder has records that are precise, it is easier and more efficient to find the information that is then needed. This makes the producer look more organized and know what they are looking for and it could potentially help buyer out if they know of the relevant information.


How Do I Keep Records?

There are many ways that producers can keep records, including hand written notes, a journal, software programs, check books, and ledgers. Keeping records can be personalized to any one's producers own preferences. There is no standard way to keep records, it can be based on a specific person's needs and what they expect to get out of it.

Electronic record keeping has become much more popular as programs like Microsoft Excel, QuickBooks, and Quicken. If a producer needs a program to run the business side and profit and loss statements, programs lie QuickBooks and Quicken are proven and help with the success of a business. If a breeder just wants to make lambing and production records more organized, programs like Microsoft Excel will help put everything in a neat layoff that way it is easy to find.

Keeping records can prove to come in handy in many instances and it can beneficial, especially if breeders and members learn to start keeping records a young age. Many 4-H and FFA activities involve record keeping, and it could be a helpful skill to learn. Record keeping can be done by hand at a very simple level, or it can become more detailed where it starts to involve business transactions and tax information.





INGREDIENTS |

LAMB --- 4 cloves garlic, minced - 1/2 bunch parsley leaves, chopped - 1/2 bunch mint leaves, chopped - 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil - 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar - 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt - 1 teaspoon black pepper - 8 lamb loin chop

POTATÔES --- 1/4 cup olive oil, divided - 1 1/2 pounds fingerling potatoes, cut in half lengthwise - 4 garlic cloves, crushed - 1 teaspoon fresh thyme, chopped - 1 tablespoon kosher salt - 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

GREEN BEANS --- Kosher salt - 1/2 pound green beans, stems removed - 1 tablespoon butter - freshly ground black pepper



DIRECTIONS |

LAMB --- In bowl, add garlic, shallot, herbs, olive oil, vinegar, salt and pepper. Whisk to combine. Place lamb chops into a bowl and add 3/4 cup of marinade (reserve remaining marinade for sauce). Mix to coat thoroughly. Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour. Preheat grill to medium-high heat.

Grill lamb to desired temperature (medium-rare is recommended). Remove from heat and allow the lamb chops to rest for 5 minutes. Drizzle chops with the reserved mint and garlic sauce. Serve with roasted potatoes and green beans.

POTATOES --- Place a sheet pan in the oven and preheat to 425°F. In a bowl, combine 1/8 cup of olive oil and remaining ingredients. Toss to coat potatoes. Pour 1/8 cup olive oil onto hot sheet pan and allow to heat for 1 minute. Place potatoes onto hot sheet pan and roast for 20 minutes or until golden brown. Serve immediately.

GREEN BEANS --- In large pot, add 1 tablespoon salt and 2 quarts water; bring to a boil. Add green beans and cook until tender, approximately 4 minutes. Remove beans from water, place into bowl with butter and toss to coat. Salt and pepper to taste. Serve immediately.



Random Thoughts From the Executive Secretary

As 2018 starts to wind down and I reflect back on not only 2018 but my 4 ½ years as executive secretary of the American Hampshire Sheep Association, many things come to mind. It has been a wonderful experience working with breeders and a breed of sheep that I have loved my whole life.

When I took over in the spring of 2014 Associated Registry was working with 23 breeds, however in those first several months we lost four breeds in various ways. In the Fall of 2018 we now serve 32 breeds and two of the breeds that left us in 2018 have now returned to Associated Registry.

In 2014 the AHSA showed a small profit and each year since that time the bottom line of the Financial statement has shown much improvement, which has allowed us to continually add and develop new programs for the AHSA. One of the biggest challenges that all small businesses struggle with is finding and retaining quality employees. As we have grown especially in the spring of 2018 we have added staff to handle the extra work load. We currently have on staff in addition to myself, five employees who work a varying amount of hours each week. Thankfully, some of them have flexible schedules that allow them to help more during the busy season.

We are continually looking to expand the Associated Registry side of the business by adding new associations and serving our current clients in different ways. We are capable of serving any species of livestock and can adjust our pedigrees to meet the various associations needs.

Turning our attention to the Hampshire association, we have seen a sizeable increase in transfers in 2018 compared to 2017. Registration numbers are lagging behind the pace of 2017 but we do have an amnesty program in place from now until the end of 2018 so all registrations regardless to the age of the Hampshire will be registered at the \$4 rate. Use this opportunity to catch up on your registry work.

The AHSA continues to offer sponsorship to many junior shows across the country. We held a small but successful junior show at Sedalia during the Midwest Stud Ram Sale in 2018. We continue to provide sponsorship to the Midwest Junior Preview Show, All American Junior Show at National Junior Hampshire Show at Louisville. These youth shows are an important part of our industry to help keep it thriving and growing.

The AHSA board is always looking for new and innovative ideas to keep Hampshires at the top in all facets of the sheep industry. Do not hesitate to reach out to a board member or the AHSA office if you have suggestions. Our job is to serve you our membership.

HAMPSHIRE HISTORY 1966

In this issue, we look back through the 1966 Hampshire flock book. A lot of great history of our great breed is contained in these Hampshire Flock Record books. They were published most years since the beginning of the American Hampshire Sheep Association.

In 1966, Roy Gilman, from Stuart, Iowa, was the executive secretary of the AHSA. Tom Durham, from Illinois, served as the president and George Scott, from Colorado, served as the Vice President. Other directors and their




state included Ronald Hogg, Oregon, Howard Vernon, Kansas, Donald Pullin, Iowa, Harrison Davis, Texas, Glen Armentrout, Missouri, Rogers Davis, Mississippi, John Nordin, Pennsylvania, S.F. McClure Jr., Virginia and Dr. H.E. Furgeson, Montana.

A few highlights that I pulled out of the flock book as I looked through it: there were 26,436 Hampshires registered in 1966 which was 18,440 ewes and 7,996 rams. Illinois registered the most head in 1966 with 2,328 head followed by Iowa, California, South Dakota, Minnesota, Oregon, Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma. All of these states registered 1,000 or more Hampshires in 1966. Breeders who registered the most Hampshires in 1966 included Leroy McCosh, Kansas, RW Hogg & Sons, Oregon, University of Wisconsin, CM Hubbard & Sons, Oregon, Green Acres Stock Farm, Texas and Mount Haggin Livestock, Inc., Montana.

The exact number of transfers was not tracked in the flock books but there were numerous groups of 20 to 50 head or more ewes that were sold from one flock to another during this time period. There were 208 new members of the AHSA who joined in 1966.


